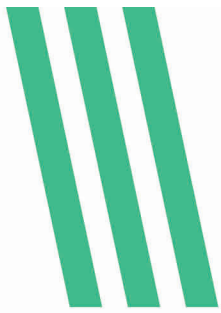

COMMUNITY-BASED

Dedicated adult mentors are matched with youth in the community. Matches commit to meet two to four times a month for no-cost or low-cost activities in the community.

BIGS IN SCHOOLS

Mentors and youth meet several times per month at the child's school or youth center.

HS BIGS LEADERSHIP

High school students learn leadership skills while volunteering as mentors at nearby elementary and middle schools.

BIGS IN BLUE

A national initiative designed to introduce youth to active-duty law enforcement officers who serve as mentors. Each officer meets with his or her Little a few times each month on-site at the child's school.

BEYOND SCHOOL WALLS

This customized workforce development mentoring program introduces high school students to regional professionals. Students and adult mentors meet bi-monthly at a corporate, educational or community location, to inspire and prepare students for their future.

YOUTH RISE STAND TOGETHER

Connects diverse youth with professionals of color to facilitate meaningful interactions and address issues of inequality through this specialized Beyond School Walls program.

SPORTS BUDDIES

Bigs and Littles meet at their local YMCA to swim, play basketball, workout and participate in YMCA-hosted programs.

"Statistically," said Dwayne Rodriguez, "I'm not supposed to be having this conversation. I'm supposed to be in jail or dead or addicted."

Rodriguez, operations lead II at UGI's Lancaster office in Pennsylvania, grew up in the inner city with a single mother who struggled with addiction and a younger brother he helped raise. "It was a rough childhood," said Rodriguez. "For other kids in the same situation, it could have gone the total opposite way. A lot of times, I say I feel I have way more than I deserve given my background."

Rodriguez said that somehow, he "steered opposite. ... I didn't want to go the same route I saw other people around me going."

He also gives credit to his high school electronics instructor, Kirk Longenecker, who encouraged him to earn his associate degree. "He cared," said Rodriguez. "He took me under his wing and gave me direction. I'm forever grateful."

So, when Rodriguez had a chance to give back through UGI's BOLD (Black Organizational Leadership and Development) program, he wanted to do for another child what Mr. Longenecker had done for him.

BOLD connected him with Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Capital Region, and after the long application process, Rodriguez was matched with a 14-year-old boy with many of the same experiences Rodriguez had—and even worse.

When he and his "Little" are playing arcade games or working on crafts, Rodriguez talks about how to handle big emotions including repressed anger, hurt and pain. Teenage boys don't say much, but Rodriguez says he has seen his Little come out of his shell and be vulnerable about what he has experienced. "These streets will eat you alive," said Rodriguez. "If I could help contribute to bettering his mindset and thought process and drive, I think I'll have done my job."

When Rodriguez learned that more than 30 children are on BBBS's waiting list in Lancaster alone, "it broke my heart," he said. He emailed UGI's community relations department, which not only shared Rodriguez's story to encourage others to volunteer, but also surprised him with a certificate of appreciation.

For Rodriguez, it simply comes down to this: "Everyone should make a conscious effort to give something that's going to benefit someone less fortunate," he said.

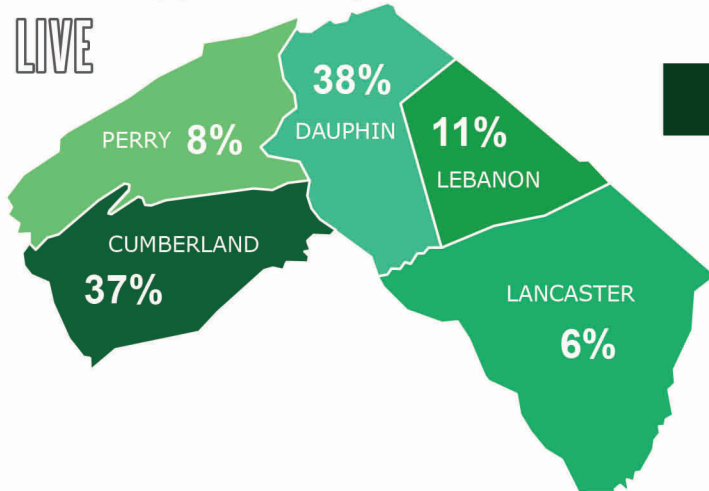

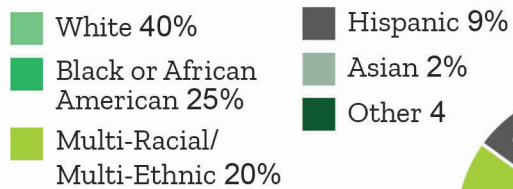

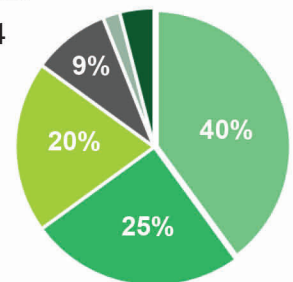

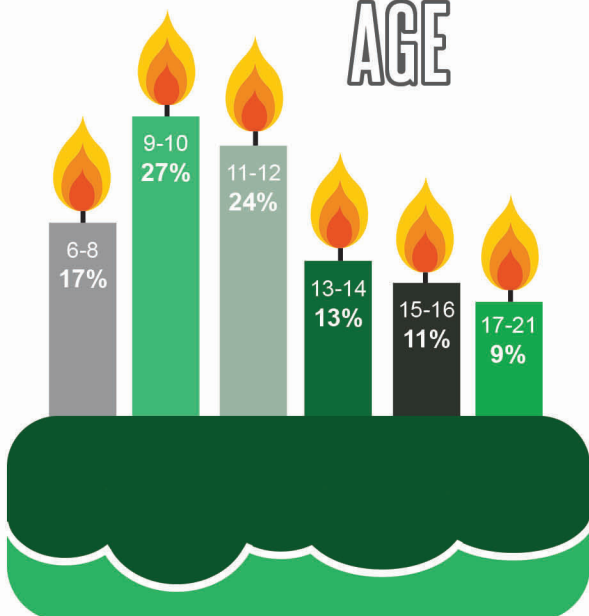

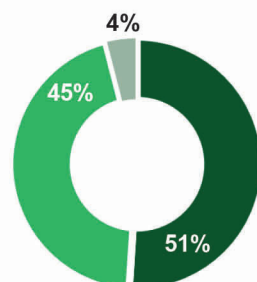

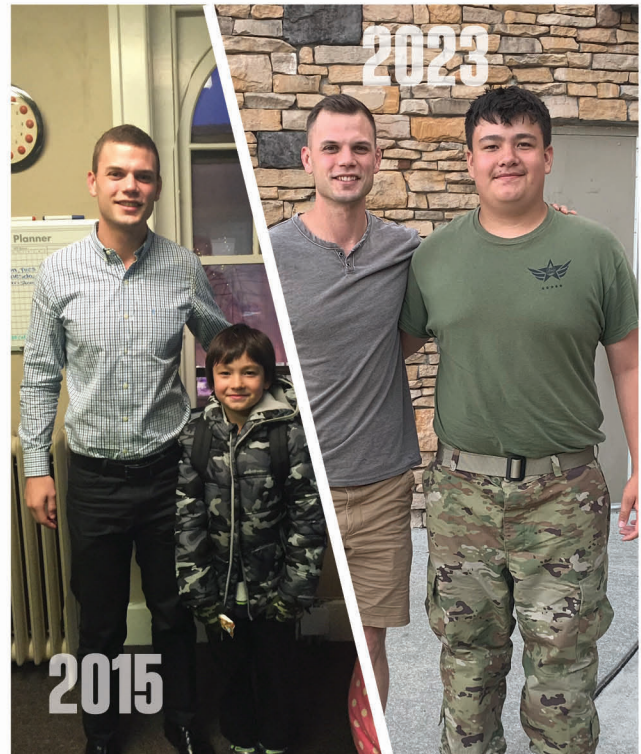

EMPOWERING CONNECTION AMONG YOUTH

When signing up to be a High School Big, Noam, a senior at CASA Charter School, says, "I didn't entirely know what I was getting myself into."

After hearing about the High School Bigs program and learning how he and his peers would mentor and guide younger students, Noam says, "I felt it would be an experience that would be very fulfilling. I really wanted to challenge myself and do something I hadn't done before."

Our staff matched Noam with nine-year-old Kaden. "I was kind of scared," admits Kaden, but that feeling quickly went away after meeting his Big; "I said [to myself], this is gonna be a fun time."

Kaden proudly states he started drawing at just four years old. "I used to draw Mickey Mouse!" Kaden shares. But, when his nine-year old brother said the image was ugly, Kaden felt angry. "I said to him, 'I'm not going to be a crybaby anymore and I'm going to keep trying and I'm going to make him jealous of my pictures.'"

He was ecstatic to be matched with a caring Big Brother who is talented at drawing. In turn, Noam feels his Little gave him, "a break from the busy work outside," and a chance to "sort of go back to my roots and draw fun Pokémon characters and Spiderman and all that I used to draw when I was little too."

One week as Noam sketched a Pokémon MewTwo for his Little, he realized they were out of time. Promising to bring the illustration the following week, Noam went home and finished the outline. At their next meeting, Kaden enthusiastically colored the picture.

Noam helped his Little Brother embrace his creativity and sharpen his art skills. "He taught me to shade in [a picture]," says Kaden, to make it look real.

Soon, they had a collection of collaborative artwork. "My favorite drawing I did with him is the King Kong picture," says Kaden. "My favorite character is King Kong!"

For both young men, art is the future. When he grows up, Kaden says, "I want to be a YouTuber and teach people how to draw like me." Noam plans to attend college and continue his education in art.

Noam says, "I've learned from Kaden how to really enjoy my time. He has a very fun, free spirit and I think sometimes I get caught up in being stressed out about things in school. He's taught me to relax and have fun."

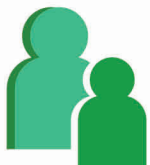

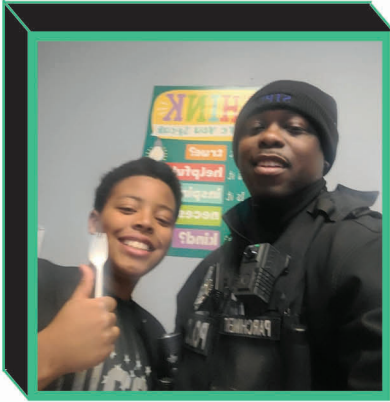

A STORY OF MENTORSHIP & SELF-DISCOVERY

Krysta Gugoff, Cash Management Operations Representative, at Mid Penn Bank knew about Big Brothers Big Sisters; several of her friends had told her about their experience in the program.

When Mid Penn Bank sent an email to employees about volunteering in our Beyond School Walls program, Krysta, "just knew it was something I wanted to do."

Krysta was matched with Mackenzie, a Susquehanna High School student. "She was very quiet at first, very shy," says Krysta. "[Mackenzie] really did have a lot of trouble speaking. She wouldn't raise her hand or offer a comment." Luckily, the two had an instant connection. "Somehow, we just hit it off. She hasn't ever been quiet with me," says Krysta.

Throughout the sessions, Mackenzie found her voice and her confidence. When our staff approached her about speaking at our graduation recognition, Mackenzie was hesitant, but Krysta encouraged her to give it a try. "If you're there, I'll do it." Mackenzie said.

At our recognition event for the graduating class of 2024, Mackenzie shared her story:

"As we gather here today, I'm reminded of the incredible journey I have made in the Big Brothers Big Sisters program. It's a path paved with shared stories, laughter, and lessons that will help me along the way.

When I first joined this program, I was unsure of the road ahead. Coming in, I was a shy kid afraid to share how I felt. Little did I know this program would help me be more confident and comfortable with myself. Together, we've navigated the challenges of growing up, learning to be confident and being the best you. These experiences taught me the power of encouragement and the strength that lies within a supportive community.

To my mentor, I want to say thank you. For your belief in my potential, even when I doubted myself, it has been a source of strength and inspiration. The wisdom you've shared and the patience you've shown have shaped me in profound ways, and I am truly thankful for the time and energy you've invested in me.

As we close this chapter and begin anew, let's remember the bonds we've formed. May we continue to grow, inspire, and lift each other up, for the journey does not end here—it only takes a new direction. Once again Thank you, Big Brothers Big Sisters for this extraordinary adventure."

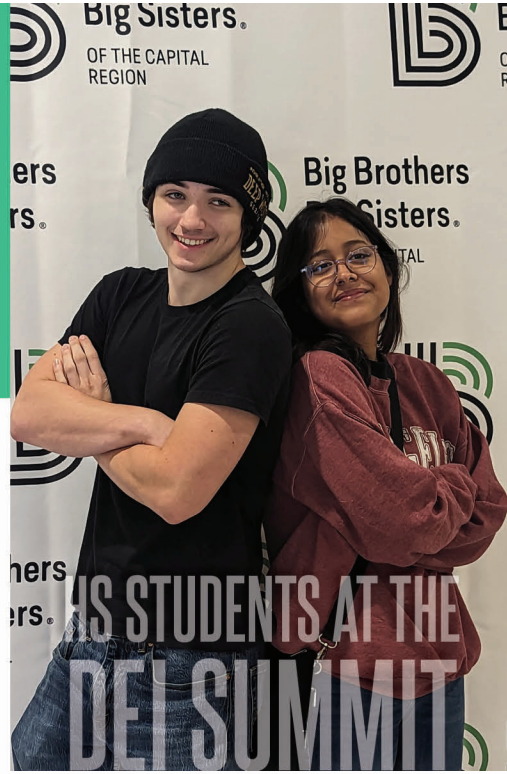

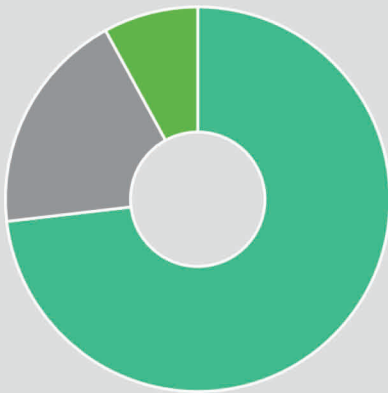

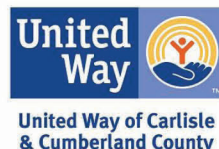
